want to use the stage at the Morehead City recreation center, with theatre scenery, the flats may be used without charge, provided there is no admission charge to see the

If the flats are not in place, or must be rearranged for use by another group, the group desiring the flats will furnish the labor and the flats will be erected under supervision of theatre personnel.

If the flats are to be used for production to which admission is charged, the theatre will charge \$20 to put them in place. That is the policy that has prevailed in the past, according to Mrs. Tressa Vickers, theatre president.
