YOUNG INDIVIDUALISTS

In the spring of 1900 when Bill Otwell made a last discouraged effort to interest Macoupin County, Ill. in his Farmer's Institute. Half-heartedly, he distributed seed corn among 500 farm boys, promised them prizes for the best display at the next session of the Institute. At about the same time, A. B. Graham, school supervisor of Springfield Township, Ohio, mulled over the possibilities of a boy-and-girl club that would tie farm and home interests in with the new fangled education scheme. Out in Iowa O. H. Benson, superintendent of Wright County schools, nosed along the same thought-channel.

At dinner time last November 29, 515 boys in new suits, 522 girls in silks and prints eddied into the ballroom of Chicago's swank Hotel Stevens. As leisurely carefree as they had been in jodphurs and wool caps at the Union Stockyards three hours before, they moved toward the candle-lit tables where Senators, Congressmen, industrialists, Federal Ag leaders waited to applaud them. Beaming oldsters looked down, voted that the 1,235,000 4-H Club members represented by these youngsters was a bumper crop of Economic Individualists from Bill Otwell's seed corn, from Graham-Benson mullings that guaranteed the safety of the American system of individual enterprise for another generation at least.

Miss Vera Proffitt of Asheville spent Sunday at home with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Proffitt.

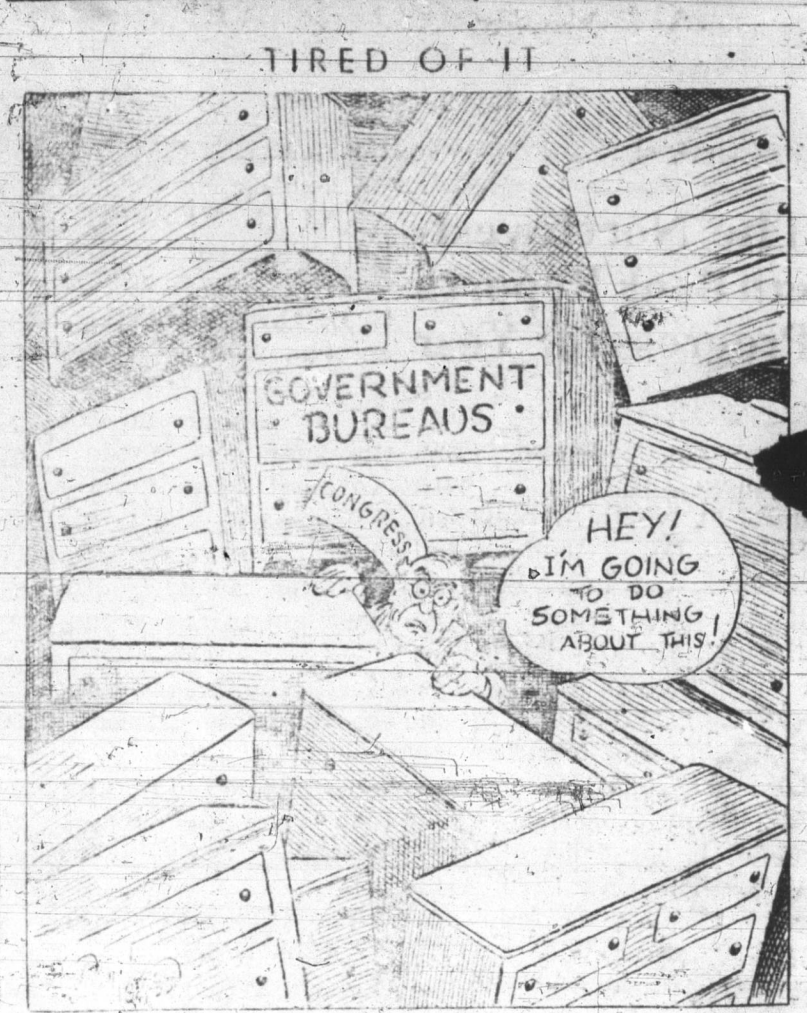
Enola Penland spent the week end at home.

Mrs. Essie McIntosh is spending the week with her daughter, Mrs. Clyde Peterson.

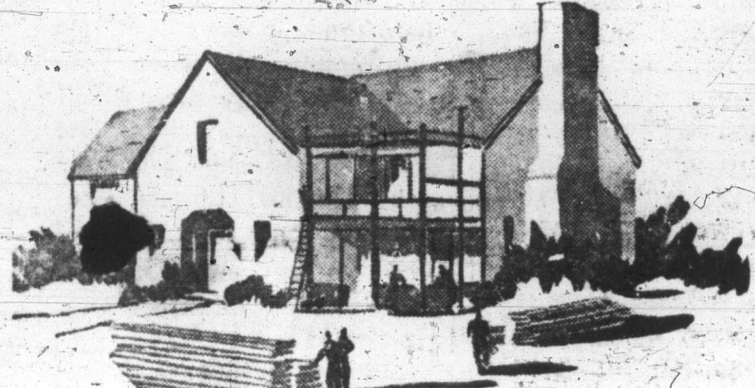
After the morning service last Sunday the Lord's Supper was administered by the pastor, Rev. C. M. Smith. The Young People gave a program Sunday night.
