

A group of men got togetherthey all had scmething in common-an idea for a volunteer f.re department that would cover the Newdale, Arbuckle, Micaville and out surrounding areas.

They began working together for this goal. These men put in many hours of hard work but it pad off. With the cooperation of the general public, the building was built in 1964 and is now worth, equipment and all, around \$10,000.00.

This is a self-perpetuating project and shows what can be done if people see a need and then begin to do something about it. Th's is what is meant by "Community Action." Many people do not understand what this means. Well, this project is a very good example.

Now, four years later, there is still something missing. Water. And what is a Fire Department worth without water? What have the firemen been using? Time, as you know, is a very important factor in case of fire.

With all the hard work the men have done, they still needed help. Charles Crowder, Fire Chief. made arrangements with the N.Y.C. Sanitation Crew to put in the water l'ne, build a reservoir and septic tank. Mr. Crowder said, "The Neighborhood Youth Corps did real work -a satisfactory job."

Teachers Receive **New Service**

Elementary and secondary school teachers and administraters in the Burnsville area will receive, starting in January, a new service designed to help them plan their curriculum so that it is completely up to date on new developments in educa-

For the first time, the myriad of instructional materials and service to the school field will all be listed by curriculum and cross-indexed by types of services and rescurces in a master reference work that also includes actual catalogs of leading companies supplying the needs of schools.

Called the PRIME Catalog, the directory-buyers' guide is provided free of charge to curriculum planners by Educators PRIME Information Service, Route 46, Totowa, New Jersey. The organization also supplies another free service to educators in the form of the PRIME Reports, a twice-morthly review of new technology and methods in the educational field. Costs of the various services are borne by leading companies which present their catalogs in the directory.
