Social Security

Q. I draw Social Security as a widow and I am thinking of remarrying but I can't afford to lose my benefits. I hear maybe I won't lose them. Please let me know something.

A. In most cases where a widow remarries after reaching age 60, her monthly benefits will not be stopped, but it would be reduced. Check with your Social Security office about your own case.

Q. Please help me find a person. I cashed his personal check a few weeks ago but the bank says it is no good. I didn't know him but he had his Social Security card and so I thought it was all right. Now I need to find him. Please help?

A. We will be unable to help you in this matter. According to law, Social Security records are confidential and we are not allowed to give out such information. In the future remember, Social Security cards are not identification and were not intended as such and never should be accepted for that purpose. They are not proof of identity.

Q. My brother died last week. He wasn't married so I said I'd pay the funeral expenses. The funeral home says they sent you a report of his death, so I hope to hear from you soon about the payment of his funeral bill.

A. The form the funeral home sends us is used to support your claim, but it is not a claim itself. You should contact the nearest Social Security office to file a claim.

Burnsville PTA Installs New Officers

Rev. Harold L. McDonald was installed as president of the Burnsville Elementary School PTA for the year 1972-1973 at the regular meeting on Tuesday night, May 16, 1972. Mr. Larry Howell, principal, performed the installation ceremony.

for next year. He also said that both schools would retain the Title I Kindergarten and emphasized that no student would be identified with either group. In the Burnsville School the two will be merged into one big room with two teachers and 2 aides. It was pointed out that the state approved the kindergarten on the basis that some form of progressive teaching be adopted; and that this would probably be an ungraded system with team teaching of kindergarten through 3rd grade in about 2 years from now.

Mr. Howell expressed profound appreciation for the wonderful cooperation received from the parents and PTA

during this school year.

Mr. McDonald spoke on the principles upon which the Congress of PTA was founded.

As part of the program, Mrs. Garland Wampler, program leader, presented Miss Tonya Allen who very eloquently gave an impressive reading, "The Creation". She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Allen of Burnsville and is a third grade student in Mrs. Ollie Young's room.

The attendance banner for the largest representation of each room was awarded to Mrs. Ollie Young's room.

Delicious refreshments were served by Mrs. Vincent Westall, Mrs. Garland Wampler, Mrs. Hubert Young and Mrs. Lillian Jelley.

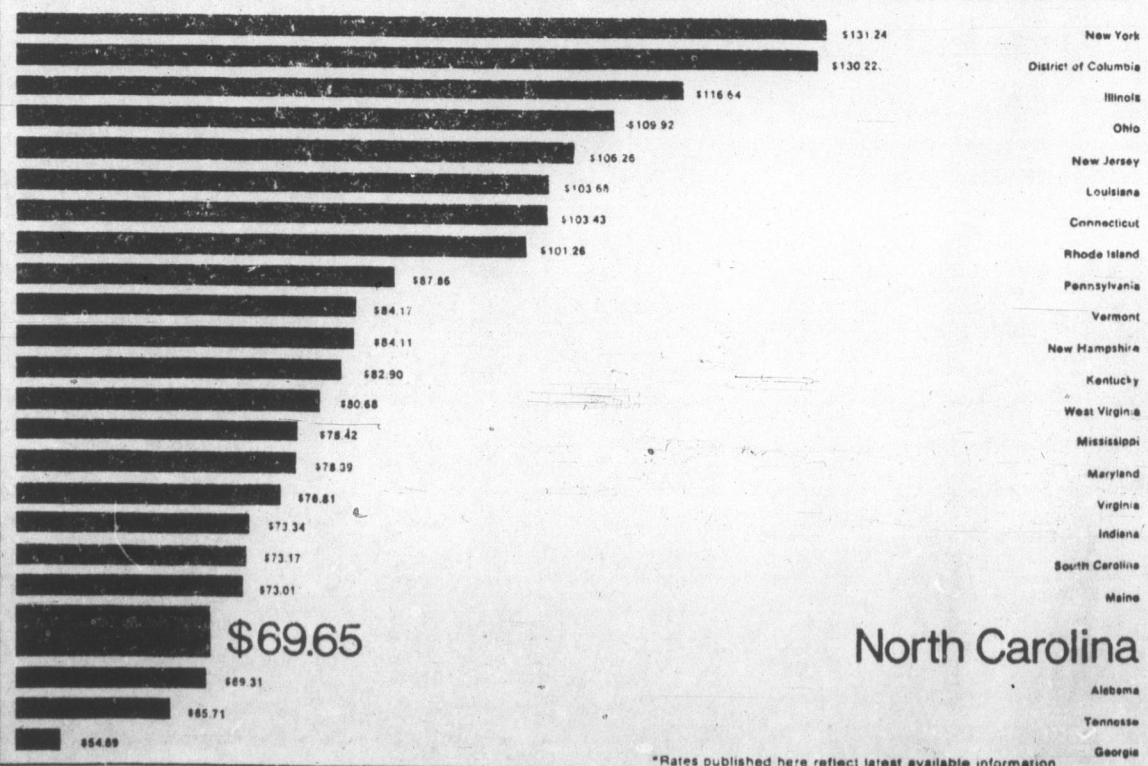
