Social Security Questions-Answers

Q. When I recently became 62, I was told by the people at the social security office that I needed one more quarter of work to be eligible for monthly payments. I now have an opportunity to work in a friend's store, but the work will only last for 4 weeks. Do I have to work a full 3-month calendar quarter to get the credit I need?

A. No. As long as you are paid at least \$50 in wages in any part of a calendar quarter, you get credit for the whole quarter under social security.

Q. I was in a bad automobile accident and was laid up for 3 months with serious bone

fractures. Since I had no earnings during this period, could I collect social security disability benefits?

A. No, monthly social security benefits can be paid only for a severe disability that is expected to last a year or longer. Monthly payments may start with the seventh month of disability. In addition, the disability must be so severe that it makes it impossible for the worker to engage in any substantial gainful activity.

Q. I will be getting married this month. Since I will be protected as the wife of a worker covered by social security, why do I have to contribute?

A. When you are ready to retire, you might qualify for higher cash benefits based on your own eligibility and earnings record. During your working years, you and your children could receive disability benefits based on your work record. And, if you should die while your children are still young, they could receive monthly survivors benefits based on your record.

Q. I'm a 19-year-old student getting social security benefits. Since I'm not sure whether I'll stay in school after this year, how should I complete the student reporting card I get in the mail?

A. Indicate on the report that you will not attend school next year. This will prevent any possible overpayment to you. If you decide to return to school, get in touch with any social security office as soon as you know you will start attending full time again.

Q. I'm a college student getting monthly social security checks. Since I've already told social security I would be in college until 1973, why do I have to fill out and send in a student reporting card?

A. Students sometimes have to change their plans. The End of the School Year Report verifies a student's current enrollment status and his continuing intent to attend school full time.

Q. I will graduate from high school this June and I won't be going back to school in the fall. My 18th birthday is in August. Will my monthly social security checks stop when I graduate in June?

A. No. You will get your last social security check on August 3 for the month of July. You do not have to be a full-time student to receive checks if you are under 18. However, for your checks to continue after 18, you would have to be enrolled as a full-time student.

Q. I'm a student, and since

my mother died I've been getting monthly social security checks. Now, the payments are mailed to my father. However, I am planning to transfer to an out-of-state school shortly. Can I have my checks mailed directly to me?

A. Yes, a student beneficiary can have his benefits paid directly to him. Contact any social security office to make this change.

Q. I am confused about when to file for Social Security disability benefits. I have heard about both a 6 month waiting period and a 12 month waiting period. Can you explain which is correct?

A. You should file an application for benefits as soon as it is determined that you are likely to be disabled for a year or longer. The 6 month period is the waiting period. You can file your application during this period but no monthly payments can be made for the first 6 full calendar months of disability.

The twelve month period refers to the expected duration of the disability. Social Security can pay benefits only if the disability is expected to last at least 12 months or longer, and is serious enough to rule out any substantial gainful work.

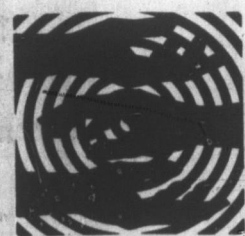

Hardly a day passes that someone doesn't write the N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission and ask where they can get a good map of some part of the state.

Trout fishermen write to ask about maps of wilderness areas in the west. Bass fishermen want maps of lakes. Hunters and hikers want topographical maps. Salt water fishermen ask for charts of the Atlantic Ocean, or the sounds behind the Outer Banks.

Most good sportsmen recognize the value of good maps and many collect them. A map won't show you how to catch a fish, but it may very well show you where to catch them.

The Wildlife Commission does not keep a file of maps to send sportsmen, partly because there are so many types, and partly because most are produced by other agencies and private firms. Also, many of these maps are not useful. Even so, we can tell you where you can get some of the maps that you may want.

One of the most frequent requests is for topographic maps that show contour lines, slopes, mountains and other surface characteristics. These maps are quite detailed, and although all of the state has not yet been mapped topographically, the coastal and mountain regions are fairly complete. Topo maps cover only a small area, and there are hundreds available.

Sportsmen who are interested in obtaining topographic maps should write to the Distribution Section, Geological Survey, 1200 South Eads Street, Arlington, Virginia 22202 and ask for a free index to the topographic maps for North Carolina. The maps are not cheap, but by being selective, you can usually find what you're looking for.

Aerial photographs are also often requested, particularly by sportsmen who want to use them in conjunction with topo maps. Aerial photo maps are expensive (several dollars each), but you can get an index for them from your county Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Service Office (ASCS). After picking out the ones you want, you can fill out a form so that they may be ordered.

Coastal charts are available

through the Coast and Geodetic Survey, Environmental Science Services Administration, Washington, D.C. If you order by mail, write first and ask for the catalog of nautical charts for the Atlantic and Gulf Coasts.

County maps (either individual or in a bound edition) are available through the State Highway Commission in Raleigh. They show many roads not found on gasoline company road maps, and they can be useful; however, the bound edition is quite expensive and bulky.

The U.S. Forest Service also publishes a number of useful maps, particularly of Pisgah and Nantahala National Forests. They are roughly the size of gasoline road maps, but show much more detail and also some contours. You can get Forest Service maps by writing the Forest Supervisor, National Forests in North Carolina, Box 2750, Asheville, N.C. 28802.

Blue Ridge Parkway maps may also be useful, and you may get these by writing the Superintendent of the Blue Ridge Parkway, Box 1710, Roanoke, Virginia 24008.

The Tennessee Valley Authority and Duke Power Company have, in the past, offered lake maps of many North Carolina lakes, and some may still be available. Write TVA Maps & Engineering Records Section, 500 Union Avenue, Knoxville, Tennessee 37900, or Duke Power Company, Box 2178, Charlotte, N.C. 28201.

For the average angler or hunter who would like to have maps and outdoor information in a single, usable book, the best bet statewide is probably to order the "Freshwater Fishing and Hunting in North Carolina" book from the Alexandria Drafting Company, 417 E. Clifford Avenue, Alexandria, Va. 22305. The company also sells "Salt Water Sport Fishing and Boating in North Carolina." Both books contain excellent maps, and you may find them on your local newsstand or at tackle stores. They cost \$5.43 including postage.

The "Coastal Fishing and Vacation Guide" published by the Graphic Press, Box 26808, Raleigh, N.C. 27611 and selling for \$2.50 is another good source of coastal maps. These books are also available at newsstands and tackle stores.
