Health Exam Required For Pre-School Registration

Spring is here-- So is preschool registration.

If your child will be six years old on or before October 16, 1973 he or she is eligible to start to school this fall. Now is the time to register your child for school if he is not already attending kindergarten.

The child will need to have a physical examination by your family doctor before entering school. In order for your child to do his best and enjoy school he must be in good health.

The North Carolina State law requires that every child enter ing any public school be immunized against dipheria, whooping cough, tetanus (lockjaw), polio and both measles. These immunizations are






