food news & cues

Many people say they have trouble getting their families to eat vegetables. Perhaps if you inform them that at one time the lowly cabbage was grown only for royalty, it will add respect for this very nutritious and easily grown vegetable. We don't know how true this story is, but like Will Rogers--all we know is what we read in the papers.

Here is a cabbage recipe called:
CABBAGE FOR A KING
3 tbsp. cooking oil
1/2 cup chopped onion
Saute onion in oil a few minutes and add 2 tbsp. flour. Mix well; add 2 cups canned tomatoes, 2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce, 3/4 tsp. salt, 1/2 tsp. sugar and a dash of pepper. Simmer a few minutes. Meanwhile spread 6 cups of cooked

cabbage in a casserole dish. Pour sauce over and top with 3 slices of stale bread crumbled; 1 tbsp. butter and 1/4 cup shredded cheese. Mix and sprinkle over cabbage. Bake in oven until bubbly hot.

This Chicken and Trees recipe comes from Betty McDonald of the Happy Homemakers Club:

CHICKEN & TREES
8 chicken breasts
1 pkg. frozen broccoli
1 can cream of chicken soup
1 can cream of celery soup
2/3 cup milk
2 cups bread crumbs
1/2 cup melted butter
1 cup cracker barrel cheese
Cook broccoli according to package. Drain. Place on bottom of casserole. Debone the chicken breasts which have been stewed or baked. Place this in layer over broccoli. Combine soup and milk. Pour over chicken and broccoli, cover this with bread crumbs. Pour butter over crumbs. Top with grated cheese. Bake 25-30 min. at 350 degrees until it bubbles around the edge. Serves 6-8.
