**Sins Of The Past**

There are some disturbing overtones, both past and present, in the Nantahala Power and Light Company rate case now before the State Utilities Commission.

The company, which wants to sell its distribution facilities to Duke Power Company, has built its case for much higher rates on the contention that its present rates do not earn it a fair rate of return on its investment.

However, the question of whether Nantahala's low earnings can to some undetermined degree be attributed to low power charges to its parent company, the Aluminum Company of America, has been raised before the Utilities Commission. And it is a legitimate question.

Furthermore, it is not a new question. Back in 1953, the State Supreme Court, in reversing a Utilities Commission decision which permitted Nantahala to increase its industrial rates, pointed out that the power firm's parent company used 81 per cent of Nantahala's power but paid in only 47 per cent of the power company's revenues.

At that time, Justice M. V. Barnhill of the high court said that Nantahala was set up to retail "just enough of its production to permit it to pose as a quasi-public corporation with the right to use the water power resources of the State, to exercise eminent domain, and enjoy other monopolistic privileges while in fact it was created to serve its master. . . . It can afford, indeed it proposes, to operate at a loss. By doing so, it

can evade the payment of its fair portion of State and federal taxes."

Obviously if former Justice Barnhill's assessment of this matter was correct, Nantahala's current effort to raise its rates and sell its distribution system to Duke Power Company is to some extent at least plagued by some regulatory sins of the past. Nantahala's customers should be charged fair and reasonable rates but they ought not to be made to suffer for any such sins in the final disposition of this case.
