Fulda, Germany Specialist Five Hubert Arrowood son of G. W. Arrowood, Route 1, Andrews, N. C., recently achieved recognition as a top Army marksman by qualifying for the expert marksmanship badge during range firing with the Army's new M-14 rifle in Fulda, Germany.

The M-14 which is being issued to Army units in Germany, will replace the M-1 rifle, carbine, Browning automatic rifle and M-3 sub-machine gun. The new rifle is lighter than the M-1, packs the fire power of a light machinegun, and fires the standard 7.62 - millimeter NATO cartridge.

The 32-year-old soldier a helicopter mechanic in the 14th Armored Cavalry Regiment's Aviation Company in Fulda, entered the Army in May 1949 and was last stationed at Fort Bragg, N.C. He attended Andrews High School,
