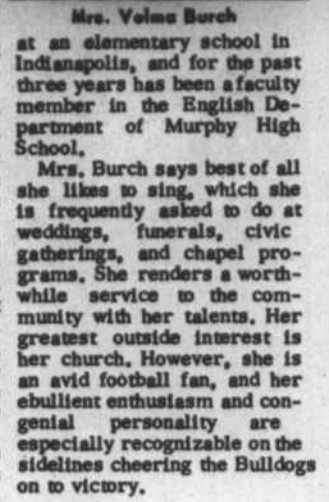

'Highly In Favor Of More Taxes For Road Construction'

RALEIGH - Republican Rep. Herman H. West of Cherokee County, who says his political life as a legislator is a side issue, threw down the gauntlet to House Democrats on Thursday, Feb. 21, on the issue of more taxes for better roads, according to a story by Doug Reed, Asheville Citizen reporter.
He wants roads built.
Now.
He acknowledges the financial straits of the State Highway Commission.
He cut through the clouds of uncertainty as to how to find more money in some flat declarations to the House Roads Committee, of which he's a member, at its first session Thursday.
It may have surprised the Democratic majority to hear Republican businessman West say it, but his solution to the funds shortage was short and theoretically simple:
More taxes.
"Taxes to provide a continuing source of revenue for road building. A revenue base that would grow as the need for roads grows each year."
West said he favored increased license plate or gasoline taxes.
"I'm in favor of getting more money for roads regardless of the political consequences," he said, "I want to see some roads while I'm still alive."
In an interview just after the committee session, West said if his proposal "is political dynamite, it doesn't bother me."
The state, he said, is continually confronted with the "dire need" for roads and never sufficient funds with which to build them.
"We're running the State Highway Commission with a budget based on revenue from license plate sales that hasn't changed in 25 years. Truck license tag costs are the same as they were 10 to 15 years ago. The tax on gasoline, except for a one per cent increase, is the same as it was 20 years ago," he said.
"But the trucks are tearing our roads up. The cost of constructing roads has gone up tremendously."
"And the need has gone up possibly 100 per cent in that period of time."
The 1963 General Assembly, West said, "has an obligation to the people of North Carolina to do something about it. I realize that revenue bills traditionally are unpopular, but the need is still great."
West told the committee "this is probably my last term here" and later said "it may or may not be my last trip to Raleigh as a legislator from Cherokee County. Be that as it may, I'm highly in favor of doing something along these lines to raise some extra revenue, so there will be a continuing increase of revenue for the State Highway Commission and so that the roads would be continually improved and maintained."
West made no direct reference to a statement issued Wednesday by two Democrat state senators, Robert F. Morgan of Shelby and William P. Saunders of Southern Pines advocating a statewide vote on a \$200 million road bond issue and promising legislation to implement the proposal.
But West said that while "a bond issue would be desirable to meet some of our pressing needs right now, once the money is raised and spent, we will have created even one more drain on the revenue system."
"There's no question in my mind," he added, "that the present revenue structure just isn't adequate. And I want to go on record as favoring doing something about it now."

The Bank of Murphy, Cherokee County's oldest banking institution, closed its doors Tuesday, Feb. 14, and is now in the hands of Gurney P. Hood, State Commissioner of Banks, for liquidation.
The Bank of Murphy was organized in 1898 and began business in 1899. For a long time it was the strongest banking institution in this part of the State. It closed on November 21, 1929, and reopened on March 2, 1930.
