"a bond issue would be desirable to meet some of our pressing needs rightnow, once the money is raised and spent, we will have created even one more drain on the reve-

"There's no question in my mind," he added, "that the present revenue structure just isn't adequate, And I want to go on record as favoring doing something about it now."


