Motion was made by L. N. Cole, seconded by W. T. Moore to place on the map 9/10 mile Road in Notia Township, known as the Johnson Road.

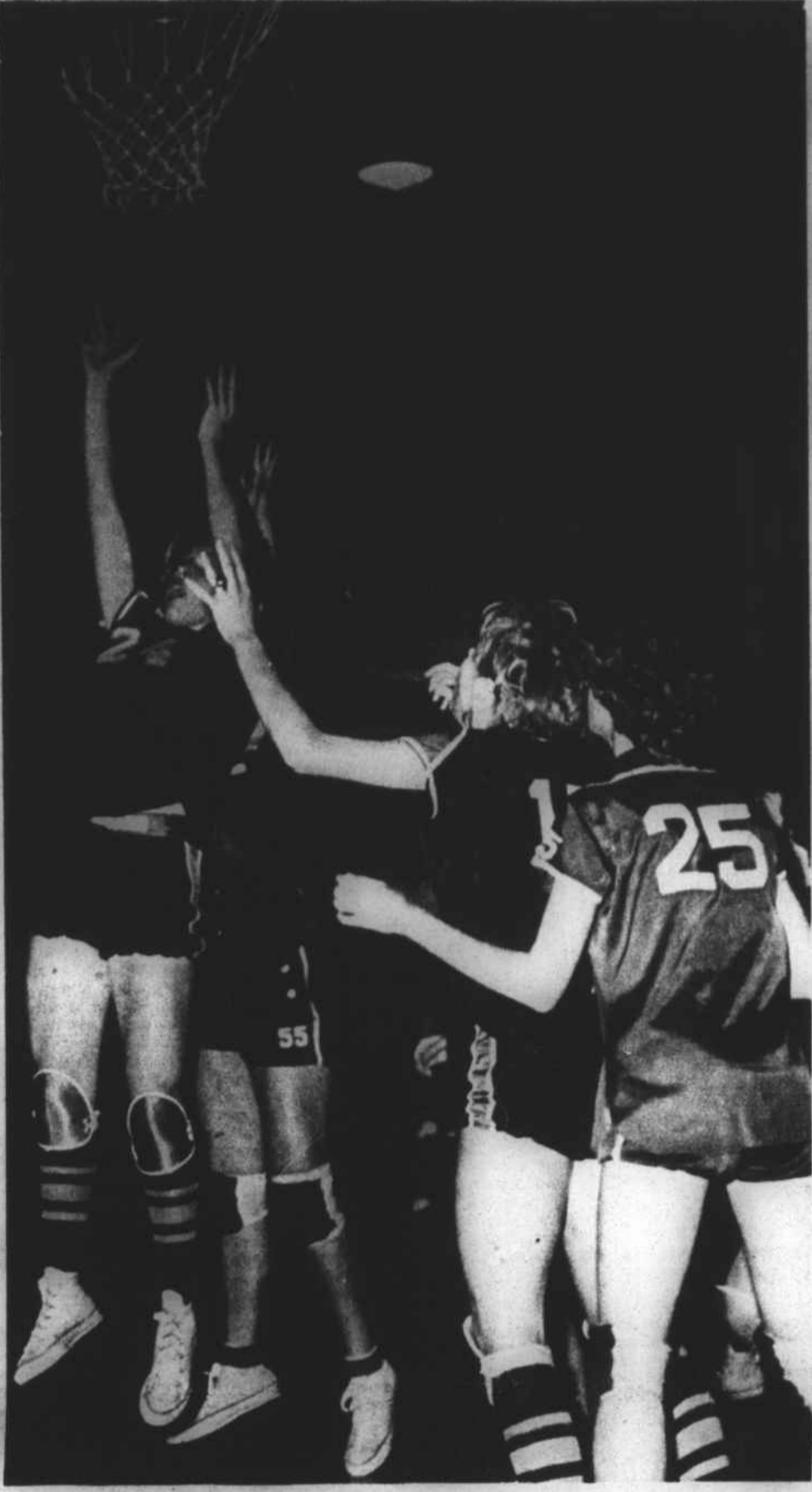
Motion was made and duly seconded to place on the map 2/3 miles of road in Murphy Township known as the Timson Road.

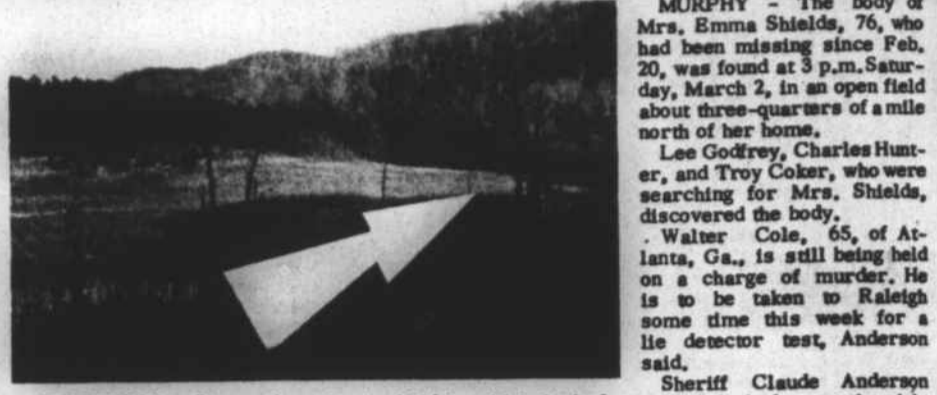
Autopsy May Explain Mysterious Death Of Culberson Woman
