## INSURANCE TIPS from HYDE AGENCY

**HOME FIRES FLARE IN WINTER MONTHS**  
During what time of the year, a reader inquires, are fires in the home likely to occur?

The cold weather season --- when home heating units are in operation --- is when fire causes a major share of property damage. Most of the nation's fire toll in lives and injuries is needless.

The National Board of Fire Underwriters suggests that you can help keep your home safe from fire by following these suggestions:

- 1) Inspect your basement or furnace room, and throw out old paint cans, oily rags, newspapers, magazines, or other combustible rubbish that may be stored there.
- 2) Check your heating unit --- Studies show that every ninth fire in the United States is caused by a defective heating unit.
- 3) If even a faint fuel odor arises from your heating plant, call a qualified heating man immediately to check your flue pipes, vent connections, and chimneys.
- 4) If you use a portable oil or gas heater, always turn it off when you retire at night.
- 5) Your fireplace should be protected with a metal fire screen, placed flush against the fireplace when it is in use. Frequently and unexpectedly burning logs throw out hot embers that singe rugs or cause even greater damage.
