Question: Are we today to
keep the feast days of the
Old Testament?
Answer: No, we are not to
keep the ceremonies of the
Old Law. When Christ died
on the cross He fulfilled
this law of ordinances that
was against us (Col. 2:14),
and upon His death set in
effect His own law. (Heb.
9:15-17).
We are distinctly told that
we are not to be judged of
men concerning feast days,
new moons, or sabbath
days. (Col. 2:16).
We are told to assemble
ourselves together (Heb.
10:25), and we are given an
example to do this on the
first day of the week (Acts
20:7). This is all the New
Testament requires in the
sense of keeping a day.
