Very often, trouble draws a community closer together. This happened in Murphy over the weekend. Everyone who helped deserves a "thank you"; from the rescue team to the ladies who provided sandwiches and coffee. To list everyone who offered assistance would be impossible.

Just this word to let all know that this did not go unnoticed.

A Small Bill

Murphy is in danger of losing a vitally important service, the American Red Cross Blood Program.

There's a simple reason. As of the last of July, the local chapter had paid none of its pro rata share toward the Blood Program for fiscal '62-'63.

It's a small bill; just \$348. There's a simple reason why this bill has not been paid. The local chairman resigned a year ago. The Blood Program resigned some time later.

As far as we can learn, no one has been appointed or elected to fill these offices.

The answer is simple too. A local meeting should be called. These offices should be filled. Enough money should be raised to at least pay this small bill.

The value of the Red Cross Blood Program is apparent. We must have it to provide adequate blood here during any emergency.

Your life may depend on it. One other thing. The Murphy Red Cross Chapter is still officially listed as the Cherokee County Chapter.

Andrews has its own chapter and blood program. This has caused much confusion in the past, both at home and in the headquarters of Red Cross.

Why not change it to Murphy Red Cross Chapter?

Time To Act

Very often, it takes a tragedy, or near tragedy, to bring home a message.

This is the case in Cherokee County this week. The County Sheriff's Department is rendered inadequate by the lack of full-time, paid deputies, and lack of two-way radio communication.

There is a difference this time, however, because this inadequacy in the Sheriff's Department has been discussed before. But nothing has been done to correct it.

The story is already familiar. The county Sheriff's Department once had paid deputies and radio communication. A locally introduced bill in the Legislature several years ago took the deputies in this county off salary. A change of County Commissioners removed the radios.

In the following Legislative session, the lawmakers turned the problem of whether or not to hire paid deputies back to the County Commissioners.

The "Home Bill" rule was passed, which allows the commissioners to hire deputies if they think it's necessary.

Whether or not two-way radios are necessary is also left up to the commissioners.

The obvious reason these two items have been left out is the fact that they cost money.

Cherokee County is already heavily indebted, due to school construction and other necessary items in the budget.

Taxes are higher than ever this year. But the old adage that "you get just what you pay for" still holds true.

The Sheriff and the deputies who have worked have done a good job. But more help is needed.

The county needs full-time, paid deputies, and adequate radio communications.

Taxpayers should let their Commissioner know how they feel about this question. It is worthy of much thought, and serious discussion.
