FEED GRAIN
As of October 1, all land that is in the feed grain program can be grazed.
Hay cannot be harvested from these diverted acres during the remainder of 1964. Anyone violating this regulation will be required to refund the entire feed grain payment plus interest.

For the 1965 Feed Grain Program, the minimum and maximum acreage diversion rates will be the same as for 1964. This early announcement of diversion rates will help farmers in making plans for the 1965 crop. The minimum diversion for participation will be 20 percent of the feed grain base. Any farmer can divert up to 50 percent of his base or 25 acres, whichever is larger.

USDA ANNOUNCES CHANGES
Changes in the method of electing county ASC committees and in the length of their term of office has been announced by the USDA. The legislation authorizing the changes was recently approved by Congress and was signed by President Johnson on August 31st.

Under the new bill, three major changes relating to the election of ASC county committees were authorized.

These changes: (1) to establish a three-year staggered term of office for the county committees instead of the existing one-year term; (2) provide that a county committee member may not serve more than three consecutive terms. Previously there was no limitation on the number of terms committee members could serve; (3) provide for the election of county committees by all community committee members at the county convention rather than by the chairman of each community committee in the county.

The new law, which does not apply to 1964 committee elections, becomes effective for elections held after January 1, 1965.
