

SUCCESSFUL CLIENT OF REHAB. PROGRAM

Started Year With Practically Nothing and Now on Road to Recovery

Pinebluff, N. C., Nov. 5—One of the most successful clients operating in this section under the rehabilitation program of the Resettlement Administration, started the year with \$25 worth of household goods and the clothes he and his family were wearing, states a report by Robert W. Scott, rehabilitation supervisor.

The man did not have a farm, and was entirely without livestock, implements, money and credit.

As he was given a good recommendation by those who knew him, he was allowed a rehabilitation loan with which to buy a mule and two pigs, plows and other necessary implements and to provide food for his family, which included a wife and five children. The loan was not large enough to provide a cow and a wagon, which were badly needed.

Supervisor Scott reports that the client was unusually energetic and as soon as a suitable farm was found which he could rent, he went to work with such a will that the fall season found him coming out of his difficulties rapidly. He had six pigs fattening for his winter's meat, a sorghum patch from which he expected to make a supply of "sop," and a much better looking and happier family. He expected to make enough money from his crop to pay the installment due on his loan and buy the needed cow and wagon, in addition.

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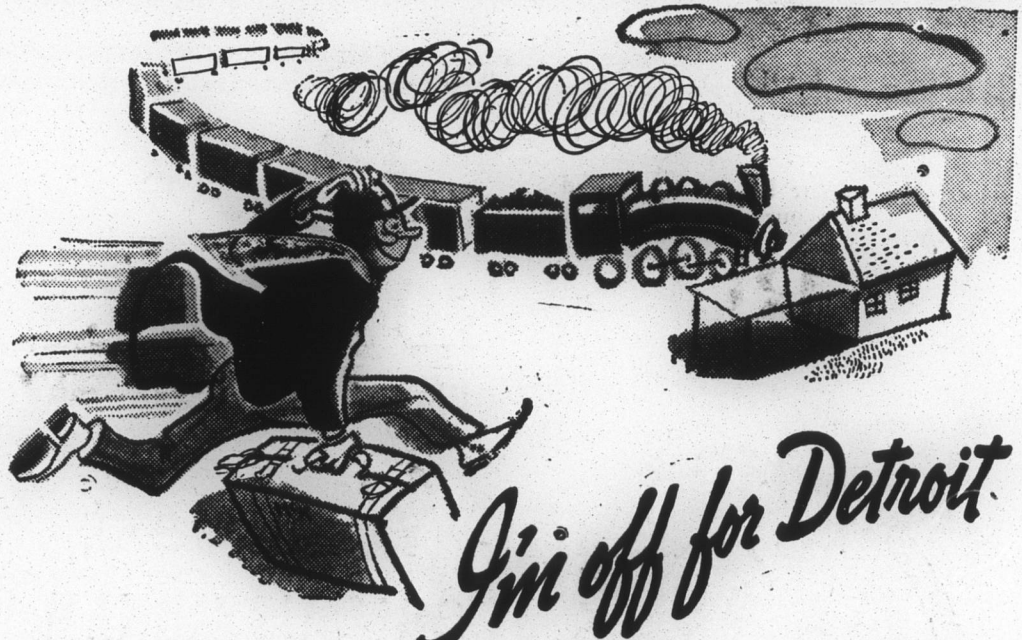
