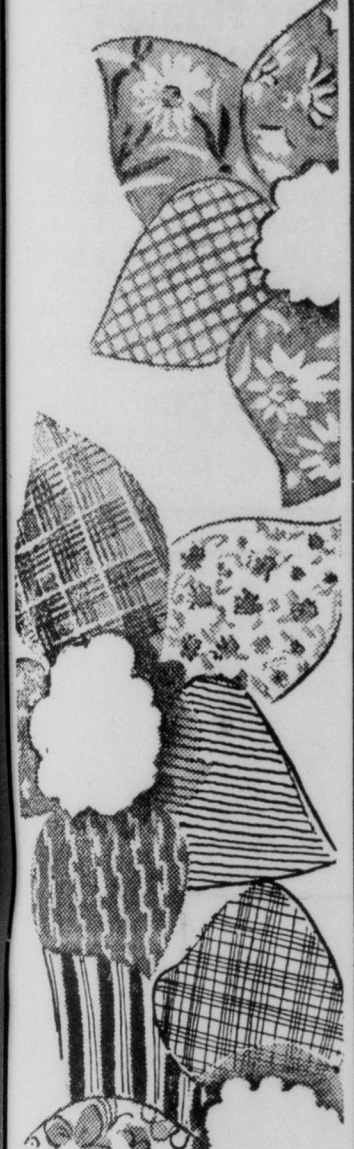


ATTEND SERVICES.
