Miss Dorothy Rumbough, former patient and record librarian, is leaving us to be married February 29. The lucky man is William Hussey of Weaverville.

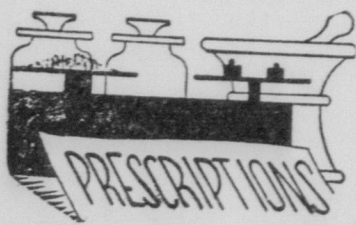
Mrs. Deborah Boggs of Asheville is joining our staff as record librarian.
