 "Dear sir: Your jokes received. Some we have seen before; some we have not seen yet."—Vancouver Province.

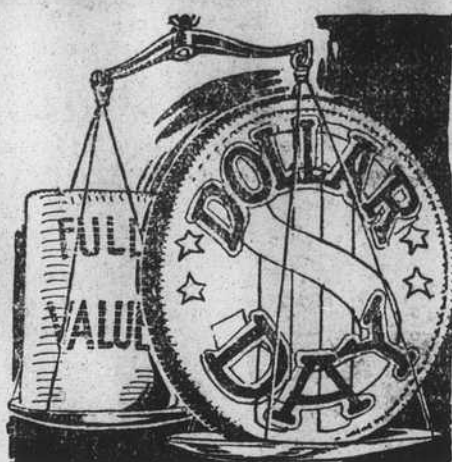
