# ATMC Improving Services To Majority Of Customers

Changes underway by Atlantic Telephone Membership Corp. on two exchanges will improve services to more than half the cooperative's customers at a total cost of about \$2.5 million, spokesman Percy Woodard said Friday.

ATMC began switching both its Holden Beach and Seaside-Calabash exchanges over to electronic computer offices this month.

Additional toll cables or longdistance lines also are planned, he said, which should make it easier to get outside the area when dialing. Also, "remote" offices will be installed to improve the quality of service received by customers at the end of the line on both exchanges-the Calabash area of the 579 exchange and soon, Sunset Harbor on the 842 exchange

The two exchanges serve more than half ATMC's customers-4,300 on the Calabash-Seaside exchange and 3,500 on the Holden Beach ex-

Among the most noticeable changes brought about by the computerized offices, customers will no longer hear a clicking sound when dialing and should get a dial tone immediately.

But the changeover also requires a change in dialing habits: from now

on, customers on the two exchanges will have to dial all seven digits rather than the last five when making a call to someone on the same exchange.

The switch-over was made for 579 numbers the night of Monday, Jan. 7, while the Holden Beach exchange will be switched over about midnight Jan. 21, not Jan. 14 as first scheduled.

Customer information has already been programmed into the system and the wiring completed, but the actual moment of switch-over still requires the manual pulling of "carbons" or protectors by hand from the old mechanical system and manually pushing in new carbons into the com-

Installation of a remote office, Woodand said, "should help the Calabash-Carolina Shores area quite a bit. They're at the far end of the line. You have to amplify it, but you still have problems with touch-tone dialing and especially with homes that have more than one phone."

Work has begun on the remote office for Calabash. The prefabricated building will be set up on a concrete slab in a field behind the Calabash Volunteer Fire Department. Installation of the toll cables has been delayed pending arrival of all the materials ATMC ordered back in July and that were scheduled for delivery in October, Woodard indicated.

Financing for the improvements came from a Rural Electrification Authority loan approved last year.
