Fertilizer Choice, Rates Help Farmers Save

Some Brunswick County tobacco farmers will be carrying burdensome production expenses from 1984 into 1985, said William Barrow Jr., assistant county agricultural extension agent.

However, future costs can be cut by taking soil samples, following recommendations and making the proper selection of fertilizer, he said.

Many Brunswick County soils, particularly those frequently planted in tobacco, have high levels of phosphorous and medium levels of potash, he added.

"This," said Barrow, "plus the fact that higher analysis fertilizers are cheaper, per unit of fertilizer applied, can save growers 50 to 75 dollars per acre."

Farm tests have shown the amount of fertilizer needed to grow a good crop of tobacco to be 50-80 pounds of nitrogen, 15 pounds of phosphorous

and 90 pounds of potash. Although excessive amounts of phosphorous and potash will not harm the quality of the crop, he added, excessive amounts of nitrogen will.

"Many farmers can skip a year of phosphorous fertilization and still not hurt their yields while adding profits," Barrow said.

"As a result, higher analysis fertilizer can supply the needed nutrients at a lower cost per acre."

"When making a selection, growers can use the following rule of thumb: The mixed fertilizer should supply all of the suggested phosphorous and possibly potash, but no more than 40 pounds per acre of nitrogen."

Once the correct fertilizer ratio is selected, one should pick a high analysis grade of that ratio. These are cheaper on a per acre basis, Barrow said.


