Ash Couple Sues Bank Over Checking Account

An Ash couple has filed suit against United Carolina Bank for \$10,000 in damages, charging the bank with negligence in handling their checking account and causing them to receive a bad credit rating.

Eugene and Sandra Whaley filed suit Jan. 23 in Brunswick County District Court against the Shallotte office of UCB for refusing to honor checks the couple wrote in September 1984. According to the suit, the plaintiff's opened an account on Sept. 19 with a credit line of \$700.

One week later, the bank "refused to honor said checks even though none of the checks totaled more' than the \$700 limit, the suit states.

The bank did not correct the problem for two months, causing the Whalevs "to suffer embarrassment and financial losses in their business" as they received a negative credit rating, it states.

Several checks the Whaleys claim they did not write, the suit states, were charged against the couple's account in October. The five checks, which did not have the same account number as the Whaleys' account, totaled \$982.96. It also states that one check for \$888.49 was charged against the Whaleys' account as well as the writer's own account.

When the Whaleys notified the bank, they were "publicly accused of having forged the checks" by an agent of the bank "in the presence of other customers," it states.

When Ms. Whaley attempted to show that she had not forged the checks, "the employee in a discourteous and in an angry manner asked the plaintiff to leave the premise."

The suit charges the bank with conduct that was in "careless disregards to any minimum standard of or-dinary banking procedure." When the couple attempted to

discuss the problem with an executive officer of the bank in Dec. 1984, they were "threatened with a foreclosure on a loan that was current." it states. The suit charges the bank with hav-

ing "willfully and frauduently modified the plaintiff's credit application" and says the bank gave them a negative credit rating. It also charges the bank with using

unfair and deceptive trade practices" to "cover up their incompeten-The suit asks for \$2,000 in actual

damages, \$7,985 in punitive damages, court costs and attorney


Oyster Roast Set


