BY SUSAN USHER Wallace H. Harding, Brunswick County's new finance director, calls his move from Orange County to the fastest growing county in the state "a career advancement" and an oppor-tunity to live in an area he likes, the coast. coast. It's also, he added in an interview

It's also, he added in an interview Monday, "an opportunity to get into some new and exciting things." Along with new challenges, the 40-year-old Wake County native gets an increase in pay from \$36,144 to \$38,098.

\$38,098. Orange, in the Piedmont area of the state, had, in 1980, a population of 77,055, more than twice Brunswick's 35,777 census. However, its 1981 pro-perty valuation was only slightly larger than Brunswick's, at \$1.8 million to \$1.7 million. Orange County is basically con-cerned with "traditional county func-tions," the functions are of the state government. But Brunswick County, because of

But Brunswick County, because of its 13 small municipalities and rapid-ly urbanising unincorporated arcas, is moving beyond the traditional and into services more typically provided by municipalities, he indicated. Not the least of these is an am-bitious \$30 million county water system with a trunk line that, when completed, will run from the north to both the south and corners ends of the county. The county is aggressively working to extend service to numerous customers directly, either through extensions into subdivisions or direct tap-ons, as well as to wholesale customers such as towns

Juggling 1985-86 budget prepara-tions in two counties, Harding work-ed his last day in Orange County Fri-day and began work at the complex in Bolivia on Monday. Marding said he thinks he brings to the county a "fresh set of eyes," an open-minded approach and a variety of finance-related experiences on which to draw. In a recent Durham Morning Herald article, Orange County Manager Kennetin Thompson praised Harding's achievements during his three years there. Under Harding's leadership since March 1, 1982, he said, the county had earned the highest possible rating for financial

records, recognized by "certificates of conformance" for the past two years. Thompson also

county. Before taking the Orange County post, the Auburn University graduate worked as assistant chief of the Fiscal Management Section of the N.C. State Treasurer's Department. In that capacity, he traveled the state providing technical assistance to local governments. Those stops in-cluded Brunswick County, about six years ago shortly after Dennis Har-rison, the man Harding succeeds, had begun work as county finance of-ficer.

he'd given to local governments. "I had spent five years telling them what to do. I didn't know whether 1 could do it.

He found he could, but in the pro-cess Harding said he "meilowed" somewhat.


