# Town Council Likes Draft Of Holden Land Use Plan

It took only five minutes of the Holden Beach commissioners' time Tuesday afternoon to accept a copy of the planning board's 1985 Land Use Plan.

"I've read it and give my com-pliments," Commissioner Jim Griffin told the planning board Tuesday. Copies of the final proposed draft were mailed to the commissioners last Friday for review.

At a joint meeting of the commissioners and planning board Tuesday, there was virtually no discussion on the updated land use plan. Planning board members have been preparing the document in coordination with the Satilla Planning Corp. of Atlanta, Ga., for months.

'I've read it and I don't see anything wrong with it," said Commissioner Gloria Barrett. "Unless someone else has anything they'd like to change.

Commissioner Hal Stanley said he read it over the weekend and liked it. Planning board members met last

Thursday to review the final draft, making only minor changes to the document. Board members commended Town Manager Bob Buck for his work on the project, with Chairman Alan Holden declaring the afternoon "Bob Buck Day" following the compliments

One section added to the land use plan last week states that the town supports the development of a bike trail along Ocean Blvd. Buck said that since the town has applied for a state grant that would be used to construct the bike path, the land use plan should support the idea of such a project. A statement to that effect was earlier deleted from the land use plan.

Resident John Clarke also questioned last week if the public has had ample opportunity to participate in the land use plan. Members of the planning board said they were not pleased with the public's participation at the series of public hearings, but that the hearings were advertised and announced ahead of time.

The town council must now adopt the final draft of the land use plan and may hold a public hearing on it after copies are available for inspection by mid-June. It must be approved and forwarded to the N.C. Office of Coastal Management by July 1.

"From what we've heard and seen," said resident Sid Swarts at last Thursday's meeting, "I see nothing wrong with it."

Swarts recommended the board avoid "nitpicking and delaying" the draft and to send it to the commissioners for approval.




