Baptist Home's Relay Run Passes Through Shallotte

Their sneakers rhythmically pounded the hot pavement last Thursday down U.S. 17 in Shallotte, one of 155 cities in North Carolina the runners will visit on their 1,487-mile marathon relay race.

Under the theme, "Run For the Children," the statewide commemorative relay run is being held to mark the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina's 100th anniversary. The run began in Thomasville on May 28 under the direction of Wayne Drumheller, who joined the Baptist Children's Home of N.C. in 1975.

The statewide marathon follows a path through Asheville, Chimney Rock, Charlotte, Whiteville, Shallotte, Supply, Wilmington and back to Thomasville, where it is scheduled to end July 6. Gov. Jim Martin proclaimed May 19 as Baptist Children's Homes Day.

The Baptist Children's Homes of N.C. were organized to care for dependent, neglected and homeless

"This is just to celebrate the 100th year of the Bantist Children's Home," said runner Don Long of Thomasville during a lunch break last Thursday. "It's going to be the largest relay race ever in North Carolina." Long was one of five runners of the

event's "support team" that jogged through Shallotte last Thursday. A team of support runners must fill in along the way where areas do not receive volunteer runners to help carry the baton-style capsule containing the names of children who have lived at one of the homes in the past 100 years.

In the baton is a microfish copy of the 12,000 or more children or their families that have been helped by the homes since they were first organized, Long said. When the race is over, the sealed baton will be buried in a time capsule to be opened by a future generation.

Long was joined in the race through Shallotte by Kerry McKenzie of Cameron, Wally Grooms of Thomasville, Steve Schmidt of Birmingham, Mich., Gary Drumheller of Thomasville and Earl Brown of Fayetteville. The runners left Whiteville at 8 a.m. Thursday and stopped in Shallotte for dinner before moving on for a scheduled stop at the

Jennifer Brown Emergency Care Home for children in Supply. They were to spend the night at the

Supply Baptist Church parking lot, in a converted tractor-trailer rig that includes sleeping quarters for the runners and organizers of the race. The Baptist Brotherhood's traveling bed-on-wheels is like "sleeping in a phone booth," Long said, but is used only as backup if no one helps "put us up for the night," he added.

Throughout the state, 700 runners have signed up to help carry the baton from city to city. If anyone would like to join the race before it ends July 6, they should call toll-free, 1-800-672-1597 to sign up.

For Long and the other support team members, a Road Team Centennial Scholarship will be awarded along with the satisfaction "of being a part of the biggest run in the state," runner Wally Grooms said. "And it's for a good cause, too."

Race organizer Wayne Drumheller said Shallotte Police Officer Eddie Reynolds and Brunswick County Sheriff's Deputy Sgt. Jimmy Bryant have "been super for us," in helping to lead the runners down busy U.S. 17 last Thursday.

Volunteer runners can sign up for one, two, three, four or five mile legs of the relay, or one of the 36 designated "walk miles" around the state.


