Permit Filed For Railroad

The Military Traffic Management Command of the Department of the Army has applied for a permit to temporarily place fill material in Allen Creek in Boiling Spring Lakes so a railroad land bridge can be constructed.

Plans submitted to the Department of the Army include the placement of 3,000 cubic yards of fill dirt and three 72-inch culverts into the creek. All material and culverting will be removed upon completion of the project.

Written comments on the proposed work will be received by the Wilmington District Corps of Engineers' office, P.O. Box 1890, Wilmington, 28402-1890, until 4:15 p.m., August 19.

"The District Engineer has determined, based on a review of data fur-

nished by the applicant and onsite observations," the permit notice states, "that the activity will not affect species, or their critical habitat, designated as endangered or threatened pursuant to the Endangered Species Act of 1973."

The decision whether to issue the permit will not be made until the N.C. Division of Environmental Management issues or denies state certification required by the Clean Water Act. The DEM issued a Clean Water Act certification for the proposal on Feb. 22.

The N.C. Department of Natural Resources and Community Development has determined that the proposal is consistent with the provisions of the N.C. Coastal Area Management Act.

Q. What are some of the most common vision problems in children?



A. Nearsightedness, farsightedness and astigmatism are among the most common vision problems of children.

Nearsighted youngsters cannot see things clearly at far distances. Farsighted children may have problems seeing clearly up close. Those with astigmatism have a distorted view of everything.

Many children also have vision performance problems. These can masquerade as other problems and are not easy for parents to spot.

But optometrists are skilled in uncovering them with tests that are part of a child's thorough vision examination. They can prescribe glasses and/or vision therapy to correct the problem.

Some symptoms parents might spot are an inability to pay attention in class; failure to learn to read; or an inability to concentrate on near tasks for any length of time.
