

Respect, Dignity Stressed At West

A new year, a new principal and a new set of standards greeted the student body at West Brunswick High School Tuesday morning as the 1985-86 term got underway.

In an opening assembly designed to acquaint students with all three, Principal David Corley's recurring theme emphasized the importance of human dignity and respect for individuals and their property.

Speaking for the faculty and administration, he pledged, "We're going to do our best to make this the best possible year we can.'

A green and gold "Trojans" banner hung just above Corley's head as students began forming their first impression of the school's "tall and lanky" new leader, formerly principal of Polk Central High in Columbus, N.C.

Briefly sketching his career as educator, former coach and former high school sports and student government leader, Corley praised both the student body and faculty of West.

"West is the best school in the county," he said, listing a continuation of that "strong image in the community" as one of his primary goals for the year. But he let students know the competition could get tough:

"I visited South (Brunswick High School) the other day. They're real competitive. They want to be the best.

Corley's other specific goals are to get to know the students and to increase student involvement in the operation of the school through the student government association.

"A lot of you have been at this school for two and three years. Look at all this experience sitting here on both sides of the gym. We want you to make suggestions for improving the school," he said.

Except for an occasional burst of laughter or applause, students listened quietly as Corley outlined basic rules in effect school-wide-until he

ministrators and faculty to reinforce the values set forth in your home, showing love and respect for one another

'Not showing proper respect lowers the image of one person for another," he said.

Students will also be expected to abide by these school rules, in addition to any established by a teacher within his or her own classroom: To be in class when the tardy bell

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rings;

. To respect other's property, both private and public; •To refrain from talking while

another student or teacher is talking; To bring all necessary materials

to class. Students will not be allowed to leave the classroom to go to their lockers;

•To neither eat nor drink in classrooms:

 To abide by the campus-wide no smoking rule:

•To leave personal vehicles immediately upon arrival at school; . To wear no hats or other headgear

•To keep to the right side of the halls and to not congregate in the center of the hall and block traffic; •To wait for dismissal by their teacher, not the bell;

•To remain in the courtyard, gym and cafeteria during lunch and not around the sidewalks or in front of the buildings where classes are being held:

 To receive visitors outside class and only with clearance from the office; with visitors to see teachers after dismissal of school rather than during instructional hours.
