

Intramural Sports Program Blossoms At West Brunswick

More and more students are becoming involved in the newlyformed Intramural Sports Program at West Brunswick which has been incorporated into the school's total educational picture.

Organized and founded by coaches Ronnie Champion and Greg Norris, Intramurals participation at West Brunswick has increased by over 100

The recreational program is conducted primarily during the two lunch periods but offers free play for students before school as well.

"We have about 130 students from each lunch period involved in Intramurals. This makes up about 25 percent of the school enrollment participating," said Champion.

West Brunswick is one of few schools in the state that offers such a program during school hours and the only school in this area (Wilson County being the closest) with such ac-

The Intramural program at West Brunswick not only involves student participation in sports but on the administration level as well.

This year the school faculty began participating in the program for the first time and has helped develop a better rapport with students.

While Champion and Norris serve as directors, a staff advisory council is comprised of assistant principal Maliston Stanley, Nancy Turner, Harold Johnson and William Cockrell.

There is also an executive council which includes one boy and one girl from each grade. These elected students assist in organization, reviewing rules, eligibility and evacuation.

A 32-member advisory council comprised of one student from each homeroom class works as a liaison to the executive council and helps make recommendations and promotes the events by providing information to students

The program is divided into three phases-individual participation, team participation and special ac-

Individual activities include hand-

ball, tennis, ping pong, badminton, horseshoes, checkers, chess, foursquare, darts, archery and golf.

Team sports include soccer, volleyball, basketball, team dodgeball, flag football, speedball and team handball

Special activities enable students to check out certain equipment for free play and also includes dances, guest speakers, movies and athletic exhibitions.

A possible surfing contest and camping trips are also being considered according to Champion.

Individuals and teams are awarded t-shirts for winning championships in different activities. Also individuals and homeroom classes that accumulate the most points at the end of the year are honored with awards.

'We feel that sports are not only beneficial to athletes but for everyone," said Champion. "We believe that Intramurals are important in that it provides all students with a chance of recreation and friendly competition.

"The program emphasizes having fun and participating in lifetime activities," Champion added.

The program also gives students something to do with their free time. During lunch in past years the kids, after eating, just sat around and some got into trouble. Now the students are given a break from class and can go and have some fun after lunch," said Champion.

The West Brunswick Intramural program has drawn praise from a number of administrators outside the school including assistant county schools superintendent Ed Lemon and county physical education and athletic supervisor Nelson Best.

"Intramurals have really aided in creating a positive environment for students' free time during lunch periods," said West Brunswick principal David Corley.

"It has given students meaningful


activities, stimulated healthy competition and provided a place for nonvarsity athletes to gain recognition.

"The program has also given students and faculty time to have fun together, been a motivation for advanced physical education and provided time for students not taking physical education to get some physical activity," said Corley.

Champion and Norris both plan to continue to expand the Intramural program and hope to get even more students involved.

"A lot of schools showed interest in such a program at the NCAHPERD convention but felt it was not worth the time and effort to get it started," said Champion.

"It has been a lot of work but we all feel that what has resulted from Intramurals here at West Brunswick has been well worth it."



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STUDENTS PARTICIPATE IN CHESS-Chess is just one of the individual activities in the West Brunswick intramural sports program. Players are, from left,

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
