U.S. Senate Race Will Be Close One

Most polls and other predictions say Democrat Terry Sanford and Republican James Broyhill are running neck-and-neck for the U.S. Senate seat. As Nov. 4 draws near, both are busily criss-crossing the state seeking votes

Sanford is a former N.C. governor, lawyer and businessman.

He is best known for creating the community college system and the School of the Arts, funded by new sales taxes he requested.

He also served as president of Duke University and advanced the Research Triangle.

His opponent had the opportunity to fill the senatorial seat vacated earlier this year by the suicide of

Sen. John East. He had formerly served in the U.S. House of Representatives, from 1962 till 1986. He was an executive with Broyhill Furniture industries prior to his election to Congress

The two distinguished candidates differ in foreign policy issues, with Sanford favoring support of Central America through the Organization of American States as a "showplace of freedom instead of another battlefield," and Brohill defending aid to the Contras fighting the Nicaraguan government. Also Sanford calls the 'Star Wars'' program a concept, not a solution, and wants a negotiation of arms reduction and a freeze on space weapons and missile testing; Broyhill supports a bilateral, mutually verifiable arms reduction treaty with the Soviet Union and continued funding of "Star Wars."



Bauerschmidt Named


