Also available are a male German shepherd/husky mixed breed dog, black and cream and 1½ to two years old; and a large, male mixed poodle, more than a year old.

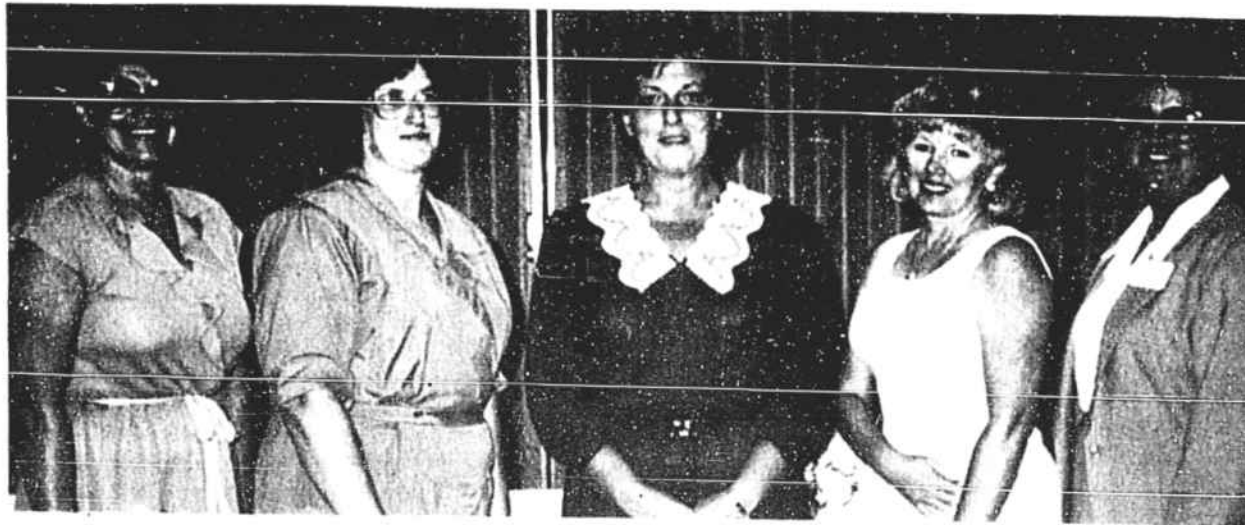
These pets can be seen between 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday at the shelter, located off N.C. 211 south of Supply.
