

Local anglers pulled in kings and flounder last week as low temperatures and high winds created conditions for some of the best fishing of the season.

Pete Singletary of Captain Pete's Marina at Holden Beach said Monday that Bruce Moore caught 59 pounds of flounder last week.

He added that winter spots have started to become a common catch inside. "With another cold snap like we've had, the spots should really start up again," he said.

Singletary also said party boats out of Captain Pete's did well on grouper, snapper and kings. "Generally, I think people were pretty well satisfied with their weekend catch." M&J Marine Service

Fishermen caught numerous kings in the 20-pound range last week just a few miles offshore, according to Joe Huber of M&J Marine Service at Seaside.

He also mentioned catches of spots and Spanish mackerel. "It looks like the fishing is starting to get better.' he said.

Huber added that the Arthur Smith King Mackerel Tournament off the South Carolina coast this week should prove to be a good one. "We're getting some cooler water and the kings are in real close. So we should be in good shape for some king fishing this week."

Steve Burr of Ocean Isle Marina attributed last week's excellent king fishing to the weather. "When you get the wind blowing strong like that, you're bound to have some kings caught.'

Burr also said outside fishermen caught several nice sailfish and some Spanish.

She said last week's highlights included 1,000 pounds of mullet caught by Diddle Floyd, 11 flounder caught by B.D. and Audie Phelps and 50 pounds of assorted small fish caught by William Usher.

Allison Hughes of Hughes' Marina at Shallotte Point said Monday that last week's fishing was "poorly."

"It was too rough outside and there was a dredge in the waterway," she explained.
