# Calabash Chooses Land Use Engineer

Calabash Council Monday hired Talbert, Cox & Associates of Wilmington to develop the town's first land

Council members made the decision following a presentation from engineering representative Ken Weeden and a brief executive ses-

Mayor Doug Simmons said the council chose the firm because of Weeden's previous and present planning work at Sunset Beach and his in-

terest in the job as revealed through his attendance and presentations at two separate town meetings.

Calabash chose from six engineering firms interested in the project, which will be funded by a \$10,000 state planning grant.

According to Town Clerk Janet Thomas, the decision needs to be certified by Coastal Area Management Association's Land Use Department before any contract can be signed.

Contract Discussed Council also continued a discussion with Little River Trash Service manager Bill Jordan concerning a contract extension.

Council members authorized town attorney Mike Ramos to draw up a five-year contract under which payment could be renegotiated after trash service increased by 25 residential and six commercial pick-

Currently, Jordan has 49 residen tial stops and 36 commercial and is paid approximately \$2,000 per **Funds Transferred** 

In other business Monday, council authorized Simmons and Thomas to sign any documents necessary to transfer \$30,698 from a passbook savings account to a money market ac-

Thomas had received a letter from the Department of State Treasurer recommending the transfer in order for the town to benefit from higher interest rates while still maintaining a high degree of liquidity.

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### U.S. Judge To Rule Soon On Resort Plaza Motion

A federal district judge is expected to rule within the week on whether to allow a motion to dismiss the seizure of Resort Plaza shopping center in Shallotte by U.S. marshals on Sept. 3.

In a document filed Thursday in federal court in Wilmington, U.S. Magistrate Wallace Dixon recommended to U.S. District Judge James C. Fox that the court deny the motion filed by Elizabeth Willis

Judge Fox has 10 days from the filing in which to decide on the motion. As of Tuesday afternoon, no decision had been filed, according to the U.S. District Clerk of Court's office.

If the motion is allowed, and Mrs Willis prevails in civil court, the government would return the

The \$1.5 million center on U.S. 17 was previously owned by her son, Alvin Bryan Willis III of Shallotte. He was indicted in June by a special Brunswick County Grand Jury on charges of trafficking and con-

spiracy to traffic in cocaine.

Shortly before his indictment, on May 21, a deed dated Jan. 15 transferring ownership of the plaza from Willis to his mother, Elizabeth Willis, was recorded in the Brunswick County Register of Deeds

Investigators have said Mrs. Willis is not considered party to any of the illegal activity her son has been accused of and was not aware of the transfer.
