Although a few classes have already met in the new building, students will be officially introduced to the facility Friday, the first day of the spring quarter.

According to Anne Marie Schettini, BCC public information officer, labs set up in the new building will include cosmetology, practical nursing, electronics and word processing.

College maintenance crews were scheduled to move laboratory equipment from the college's Southport Annex this week and library materials next week.

Festival include celebrity guests Charles Robinson and Kassie Wesley and singer Tracie Marie Broach.






