Of the 61,000 students who participated in TIP's talent search this year, only 2,243 qualified for this honor.

"Exceptional academic talent is a precious national resource that is often undervalued or ignored in our society," said TIP's executive director, David Goldstein, Ph.D. "For many outstanding young people, recognition from TIP is an important source of support and encouragement for their efforts."

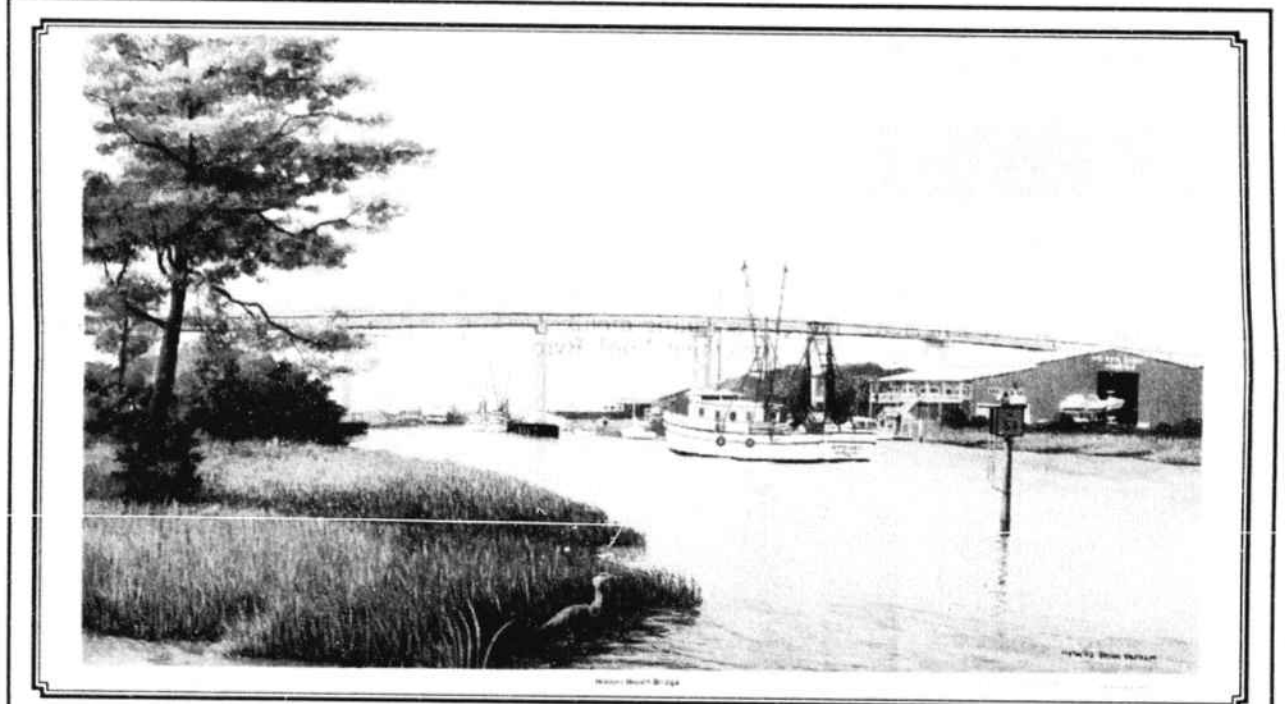
