"Everyone had a great time, but even more important, the students learned about the importance of physical fitness and reducing the risk of cardiovascular disease,' Champion said. "Those lessons will pay dividends throughout their lifetimes.

American Heart Association. Since the program started in 1979, nearly 10 million teachers and students nationwide have participated.




