

These Questions Are 'For The Birds'

Dear Plant Doctor: I have two questions about plants that involve birds indirectly. Could you please tell me what is affecting my holly bushes? I have enclosed leaves for you to see. There is something like powdery mildew and webs on the underside of the leaves. I would prefer to use something organic for the problem if possible because the birds get inside these bushes often and eat the berries.

The other question involves the identification of the small branch enclosed in the letter. The bush was destroyed when our septic tank was redone. It was a large shrub with trailing white clusters of small white flowers and purplish-black berries. Our resident mockingbird loved this plant and I would like to replace it.

Answer: The problem with your holly is the tea scale (Fiorinia theae). The tea scale is primarily a problem with camellias but will also attack and severely damage many species of holly (as you will testify). Getting rid of this pest will be difficult but not impossible. First, prune your holly. Open up the plant for maximum air circulation and light penetration. Second, soil test and fertilize plants as recommended. Third, apply a recommended insecticide.

scale is in the early spring just after all danger of frost is past. Use the laamount bel-recommended of Dursban 6.7 EC applied in two applications 10 days apart.

I do not know of a "nonpesticide" method that will control tea scale. Proper application of insecticide should cause no danger to birds. According to the National Wildlife Federation, the common house cat is a much greater threat to song bird populations than nearly any other factor. An estimated 19 million song birds are killed by "kitty" every year. Urban cat populations as high as 1,295 cats per square mile were identified in a Wisconsin study. Similar results were found in a study conducted in England.

Your resident mockingbird has good taste. Although the leaves were crushed I believe the plant you enclosed is a native shrub called the Southern Wax Myrtle (Myrica cerifera). This is one of my favorite native ornamental plants. You should have no trouble locating a nice specimen at local nurseries.

Dear Plant Doctor: I live in the center of the "sandhills" of North Carolina (Aberdeen) and would like to grow some grass in my yard. I have very sandy soils and heavy shade in my yard. I tried tall fescue last year. It looked great all spring but died by midsummer.

Please tell me what to do to get grass to grow!

Answer: If you really want a fine lawn you have several options: 1. Remove trees and/or limbs to

admit more sunlight. Install an irrigation system. Soil test and amend the soil according to test recommendations. Plant and maintain the warm season turf grass of your choice.


2. Leave the trees and/or limbs. Soil test and amend the soil according to test recommendations. Plant a suitable shade loving groundcover, such as English ivy, Asiatic Jasmine,

3. Leave the trees and/or limbs. Soil test and amend the soil according to test recommendations. Install an irrigation system. Plant a shade

loving warm season grass such as "Raleigh" St. Augustine grass. Plan to treat for insects and disease problems, since a shade stressed lawn will require more pesticide application because of reduced sunlight and poor air circulation.

I am sending you a copy of Carolina Lawns. Please review it before making any drastic decisions. Give your local extension agent a call about the details. Good luck.


