

Dr. L'Tanya Webb Sloan, daughter of Mrs. and Mrs. John H. Sloan, and granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ike Pierce, graduated, receiving the degree of Doctor of **Education** on July 24, 1993 from Clark Atlanta University in Atlanta, Georgia.

Formerly an educator in Brunswick County Schools, Dr. Sloan was featured in the Wilmington Morning Star News, January 24, 1984, in an article entitled, "Educator L'Tanya Sloan Seizes Each Minute Firmly" ... and "seizes it" she does!

She graduated from North Brunswick High in 1973. Upon completion of her B.A. in English from University of North Carolina at Wilmington, she taught Senior English at North Brunswick for two years before being promoted to central office administration.
