



Pickett Photography Exhibit At SCC Through October 29

County native David Pickett will be exhibited in the Upstairs Gallery at Southeastern Community College in Whiteville through Oct. 29.

"God's Country" is a collection of black-and-white and color photographs which Pickett says he feels "capture the beauty and tranquility of Virginia and North Carolina.

Pickett became interested in art and photography as a child and received his first camera in seventh grade. A graduate of West Brunswick High School, he went on to attend the UNC at Asheville, where he became photo editor of the student newspaper. He taught himself to develop and print film, and learned the artistic aspects of photography from his mentor, Asheville photographer John Davis.

Pickett used a long exposure to transform a mountain stream into "Waters Flow," a large black-andwhite piece shot in 1984. Also fea-

The photographs of Brunswick tured in the exhibit is "Curtains Blow," an unusual view of the Biltmore House in Asheville. Pickett also does portrait photography but says he prefers to capture people in their natural settings.

Pickett currently serves as agent for the Microenterprise Loan Program at SCC. The program provides start-up or expansion loans to small businesses in Columbus, Brunswick,
