Traveling Exhibition On Black Migration In Wilmington

The Cape Fear Museum on Nov. 19 will open the highly acclaimed Smithsonian traveling exhibition "Field to Factory: Afro-American Migration, 1915-1940" in the museum's east gallery.

The exhibition describes the movement of southern blacks to the North in search of better jobs and a more promising life. It will run through Jan. 9, 1994.

The photopanel exhibition incorporates oral histories and personal artifacts to examine the migration of southern blacks to the North. Divided into three sections, "Field to Factory" examines life for southern blacks at the turn of the century, their journey to the North, and the new northern urban world experienced by blacks from the rural South.

"Field to Factory" evolved from a major exhibition at the Smithsonian's National Museum of American History. It was the first in-depth Smithsonian exhibition to focus on a period of America's overall social and demographic history from a black perspective.

Cape Fear Museum is at 814 Market Street. It is open to the public Tuesday through Saturday, 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. and Sunday from 2-5 p.m.

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
