in the press box.

It's decided by a panel of sportswriters who vote each week on the teams that they think are the best in the nation. The problem is, these writers only see a handful of teams during the course of a season.

It's ridiculous to think that a sportswriter can vote intelligently about a team he or she has never seen play.

It's absurd to rank a team like Florida State, which has one loss, ahead of a team like West Virginia, which is undefeated. Unless these two teams play head-to-head, there's no way to know which one is superior.

That's why polls are useless. Until big-time college football rids itself of the politics and establishes a playoff system, it will always be a Mickey Mouse sport in my mind.
