**Child Care Training Series Begins March 31 At Bolivia**

## January Weather Includes **Record Low Temperature**

January 1994 was cool and damp, according to the monthly climatological report of the National Weather Service Wilmington office.

The average temperature of 44 degrees was 9/10 of a degree below normal.

Two days had maximum tempearatures at freezing-32 degrees-or lower, compared with a normal of one-half day.

Record low temperatures were set on the 16th-10 degrees above zero-and on the 19th, with 12 degrees. No record high temperatures occurred during the month. The warmest temperature was 72 degrees on the seventh day.

Lowest temperatures at freezing or lower occurred on 15 days, compared with a normal of 13.6 days. The low of 10 degrees on the 16th was also the lowest for the month.

The 7.03 inches total water equivalent of precipitation made January 1994 the fifth wettest January on record in Wilmington. Rainfall of 1.54 inches on the 30th set a new record for the date. The previous record of 1.15 inches was set in 1960.

There were 12 days of measurable rain, compared with 10.6 days for a normal. No snow fell during the month. No thunder was reported.

Sunshine was 55 percent, compared with the normal 57 percent. Sky cover of 6.4 tenths in daylight hours compared with 6.1 tenths. There were nine clear days, five partly cloudy days and 17 cloudy days.

Lowest pressure for the month was 29.40 inches on the 4th when a vigorous winter storm passed north of the forecast area. The highest sea level pressure of 30.76 inches occurred on the 16th, the coldest day of the month having dense cold air.

Only one day had heavy fog, which matches with a normal of 2.5 days

Highest peak wind gust was 43 mph from the southwest during the Jan. 4 storm. Wind speeds averaged 9.2 mph for the month, compared with a normal of 9.0.

The Brunswick County Literacy Council kicked off the new year by training 10 volunteers to help improve the literacy skills of low-level readers.

The volunteers were trained in the Laubach Way to Reading, a phonicsbased method of teaching reading, during a 10-hour workshop Jan. 28-19. Trainer Susan Eggert led the workshop at Town Creek Park, assisted by apprentice Teddy Altreuter.
