NOTICE OF SPECIAL BOND REFERENDUM IN THE TOWN OF SUNSET BEACH, NORTH CAROLINA A special bond referendum will be held in

the Town of Sunset Beach, North Carolina between 6:30 A.M. and 7:30 P.M., on Tuesday, April 5, 1994, at which there will be submitted to the qualified voters of said Town the following question:

Shall the order adopted on February 7, 1994, authorizing not exceeding \$5,000,000 Sanitary Sewer Bonds of the Town of Sunset Beach, North Carolina, for the purpose of providing funds, with any other available funds, for designing and constructing a portion of a sanitary sewer system for said Town, within and without the corporate limits of said Town, including the construction end installation of sewage collection mains and lines, sewage interception mains, sewage force mains, sewage pumping facilities end appurtenant facilities to collect and transport sewage treatment by the South Brunswick Water and Sewer Authority or another entity other than said Town, and the acquisition of any necessary land, rights of way and equipment, and authorizing the levy of taxes in an amount sufficient to pay the principal of and the interest on

said bonds, be approved? The question hereinabove set forth contains a statement of the purpose for which the bonds are authorized by the order referred to in such question.

If said bonds are issued, taxes in an amount sufficient to pay the principal and interest thereof will be levied upon all taxable property in the Town Of Sunset Beach

For said referendum the regular registration books for elections in the County of Brunswick will be used and the registration books, process or records will continue to be open for the acceptance of registration applications and the registration of qualified persons from 8:30 A.M. until 5:00 P.M. on Monday through Friday, inclusive; of each week at the office of the Brunswick County Board of Elections located in the County Government Center, on Highway 17, in Bolivia, North Carolina

In addition, registration applications will be accepted by and qualified persons may register with the registrars and judges of elections for the several precincts in Brunswick County, by appointment, and with special registration commissioners designated by the Brunswick County Board of Elections, at such times and places as may be announced by the Brunswick County Board of Elections.

Also, registration applications will be accepted and qualified persons may register at any public library located in Brunswick County, during normal business hours, and with special registration commissioners at the offices of the Division of Motor Vehicles tocated in the State when applying for, renewing or correcting their driver licenses

Furthermore, certain persons in the armed forces and their spouses, certain veterans, certain civilians working with the armed forces, and members of the Peace Corps may register by mail at any time prior to said referendum in the manner provided in Article 21 of Chapter 163 of the General Statutes of North Carolina and in person at any time, including the day of said referendum. Those residents of the Town who have not

voted in either of one of the two most recent successive presidential elections or in any other election conducted in the Period between said two elections will not be considered to be registered under Brunswick County's permanent registration system.

Those residents of the Town who are presently registered under Brunswick County's permanent registration system and who have not changed residence since their registration will be permitted to vote in said referendum

The last day on which registered voters who are residents of the Town and have changed residence to the precinct in which the Town is located from another precinct since their registration may transfer registration is Monday, March 14, 1994, except that any person who has so changed residence

Incubator Awarded \$10,000 Grant Brunswick Electric Membership Corporation's business incubator near Whiteville has been awarded a \$10,000 grant by the North Carolina Technological ties across the state to develop business incubators as Development Authority.

Grant monies will be used for facility and capital improvements at the Business Development Center, an incubator co-sponsored by BEMC and Southeastern Community College.

Business incubators assist new business owners by providing a building that can be shared by several companies. The businesses share services to reduce start-up costs, while owners gain valuable management skills.

The 24,000-square-foot Business Development Center is located two miles south of Whiteville. It opened in October 1991 and currently houses six active businesses.

They are Remote Data Systems Inc., Noone Gloves of Carolina Inc., Calibrations Ltd., Coastal Temporary Services Inc., Live Oak Timber Inc. and Complete Janitorial Supplies.

The six businesses have added approximately 140 obs to the area and their combined gross sales exceeded \$3 million in 1993, according to a BEMC news release.

The Business Development Center assists small manufacturing companies and service-type businesses. They share a FAX machine, copier, conference room, receptionist, parking lot and restrooms

Southeastern Community College also provides a part-time facility manager who serves as a business consultant

The North Carolina Technological Development Authority (NCTDA) is a non-profit economic development corporation based in Research Triangle Park that supports innovative, new companies statewide.


