The Tar Heels posted a first-round team score of 294 on Saturday and came back with a 301 Sunday to defeat second-place finisher Belmont Abbey by 15 strokes.

UNC-Aiken was third with 613, followed by Presbyterian at 618 and High Point at 622. Defending champion UNC-Wilmington placed ninth with a 628 total, and tournament host Catawba was 10th with 638.
