WEST STARTS 2-0 Branch Powers Trojans Past Waccamaw

West Brunswick's baseball team trailed Waccamaw Academy 4-0 last Thursday when Trojan outfielder Wayne Branch stepped to the plate and did something he had never done in his life.

The senior outfielder belted his first career home run, and later tripled to drive in the game-winning run to lead the Trojans to an impressive 6-4 win over the visiting Warriors.

"Wayne had a big offensive night for us with the home run and gamewinning hit," West Brunswick Coach Mike Alderson said. "The home run sparked the team a little bit. It put a fire under them."

Branch's big night at the plate wouldn't have mattered, however, if it wasn't for the excellent job done by relief pitcher Phillip Leonard.

The junior right-hander entered the game in the second inning after backstop.

the Warriors had knocked West Brunswick starter Cameron Jones out of the game with a four-run outburst.

"We got down early and Phillip came in and held them at bay,' Alderson said. "They didn't get anything off Phillip."

With Leonard silencing Waccamaw Academy's bats, Branch gave the Trojans the spark they needed with a solo home run to right-center in the bottom of the third inning.

In the fourth, West Brunswick tied the game by scoring three runs with two outs. Leonard started the rally with a one-out single, and Eric Johnson was hit by a pitch.

James Morgan-the courtesy runner for Leonard-and Johnson advanced on Heath Inman's sacrifice fly. Both runners scored on wild pitches that eluded Waccamaw catcher Dan Greene and rolled to the

West tied the game on Neil Warren's ground single up the middle, which scored Jay McRoberts from third.

The Trojans took the lead in the sixth when Warren reached base on a dropped third strike and scored on Branch's line triple into the rightcenter field alley. Branch later scored on a wild pitch to give West a 6-4 lead.

"We needed a game like this early in the season. We needed a game where we got behind and came back," Alderson said. "This will help us later in the season. At least we know we have comeback capabilities."

The victory lifted West Brunswick's record to 2-0 heading into this week, when the Trojans had four non-conference games on the schedule.

"I'm pleased with the guys so far. They're working hard in practice,"

Alderson said. "If the pitching staff holds up, we'll give some people some fits."


