

BOND ORDER AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS OF BRUNSWICK COUNTY, NC, IN THE MAXIMUM AMOUNT OF \$2,030,000, TO FINANCE WATER SYSTEM IMPROVEMENTS

WHEREAS, by resolution adopted April 11, 1994, the Board of Commissioners of Brunswick County, NC (the "County"), stated its proposal to issue general obligation bonds to finance the cost of certain water system improvements; WHEREAS, pursuant to Article V, Section 4(2) of the North Carolina Constitution and Section 159-49(2) of th North Carolina General Statutes, the County is authorized to issue general obligation bonds in a fiscal year without referendum approval to the extent of two-thirds of the amount by which the County's outstanding indebtedness was reduced during the next precading fiscal year.

outstanding indebtedness was reduced during the next preceding fiscal year;
WHEREAS, the County reduced its indebtedness in the fiscal year ended June
30, 1993, in an amount that will allow it to issue approximately \$2,030,000 of general obligation bonds in the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1993, without referendum

WHEREAS, the County has applied to the North Carolina Local Government Commission for its approval of such bonds, and such Commission has notified the County of its acceptance of such application:

BE IT ORDERED by the Board of Commissioners of Brunswick County, North Carolina, as follow

1) Pursuant to Article V, Section 4(2) of the North Carolina Constitution and NC Gen Stat. Sec. 159-49(2), there are hereby ordered to be issued general obligation bonds of the County to finance costs of water system improvements, includation bonds of the County to linearce costs of water system improvements, including engineering and design costs related to enhanced and expanded water treatment, distribution and storage facilities. The bonds issued for this purpose may be combined for sale with bonds authorized for similar or different purposes.

 The maximum aggregate principal amount of the bonds issued for such pur-pose shall be \$2,030,000. 3) Taxes will be levied in an amount sufficient to pay the principal of and inter-act on the bonds so issued.

4) A sworn statement of debt prepared by the county;'s Finance Officer has been filed with the Clerk to this Board. Such sworn statement of debt is hereby accepted by the Board and is open to public inspection.

5) The actions of the County's Director of Fiscal Operations in filing an appli cation with the North Carolina Local Government Commission for its approva cation with the North Carolina Local Government Commission for its approval of the issuance of such bonds are hereby ratified, confirmed and approved. The form of such application, a copy of which has been made available to the Board of Commissioners at this meeting, is hereby approved.

6) This Bond Order shall take effect thirty days after its publication following adoption, unless it is petitioned to a vote of the people as provided in NC Gen. Stat. Sec. 159-60, in which event this Bond Order will take effect when and if
