# State Board To Award Planning Contract For Oak Island Bridge

The state Board of Transportation Friday is expected to award a contract to a Raleigh firm to prepare planning and environmental studies for construction of a second bridge to Oak Island.

The contract proposes a maximum fee of \$171,847 be paid to DSAtlantic.

Plans for the project call for building a twolane facility from South Middleton Avenue to N.C. 211. Middleton Road will be widened from Beach Drive to S.R. 1190 and the bridge over Davis Creek replaced.

Work on the project had been delayed because of discussions among property owners and the state over donation of partial right of way.

This contract will move the planning phase nearly one year ahead of the schedule included the sstate Transportation Improvement in Program adopted this summer.

Total project cost is expected to run about \$6.75 million, of which \$4.95 million would be for actual construction.

In related action, the board is expected to approve construction on Beach Drive from Oak Island Drive to Middleton Avenue in Long Beach, at a cost of \$200,100.

Also on the agenda for funding approval are these county projects:

drainage improvement at the west end of

Main Street, Sunset Beach, \$30,000;

drainage outfalls to improve roadway drainage on Caswell Beach Road, Caswell Beach, \$15,000;

preliminary engineering for relocation of the intersection of Old Fayetteville Road and Village Road, Leland, \$75,000;

widening N.C. 211 to three lanes a distance of four-tenths of a mile northward of the existing curb and gutter section in Southport, \$100,000; and

replacement of Bridge No. 97 over Juniper Creek on S.R. 1340, \$142,000 for right-of-way acquisition.

permits issued climbed 9.7 percent, from 3,289 in the first nine months of 1993 to 3,575 so far this year.

A total \$16.5 million worth of construction has been permitted this year in the unincorporated areas of Brunswick County, Varnamtown, Bolivia, Leland, Belville, Navassa and Sandy Creek.

There were 13 new homes and 57 mobile homes permitted during September. Three permits were issued for multi-family dwellings worth \$197,200. There were two commercial permits issued for construction totalling \$98,400. For additions valued at \$165,576 were permitted along with three garages worth \$54,480 and four decks or porches valued at \$12,640.

In all, there were 426 permits issued for more than \$1.5 million worth of construction during September. Of those permits, 127 were for building, 145 for electrical, 116 plumbing and 38 mechanical.

The total value of stick-built houses permitted during September was just under \$1 million. The average value of homes built this year is \$67.397.
