Mr. and Mrs. Fenner Lupton

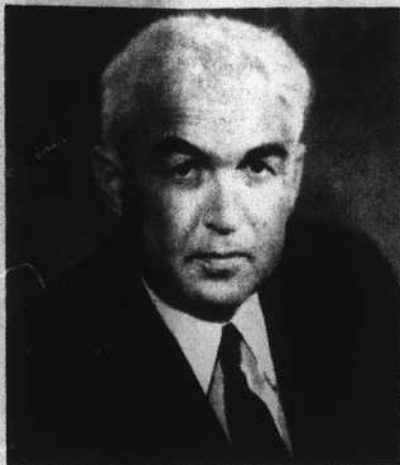

There were a large number of people from Hobucken who attended the Democratic Rally in Oriental this past Sunday.

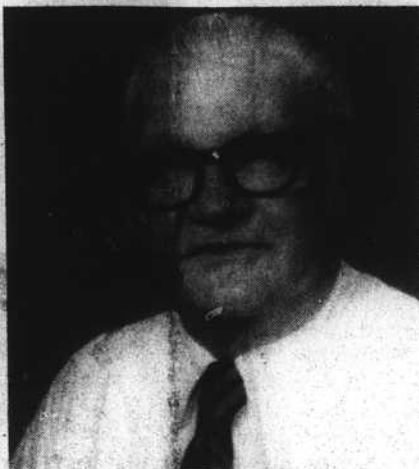
