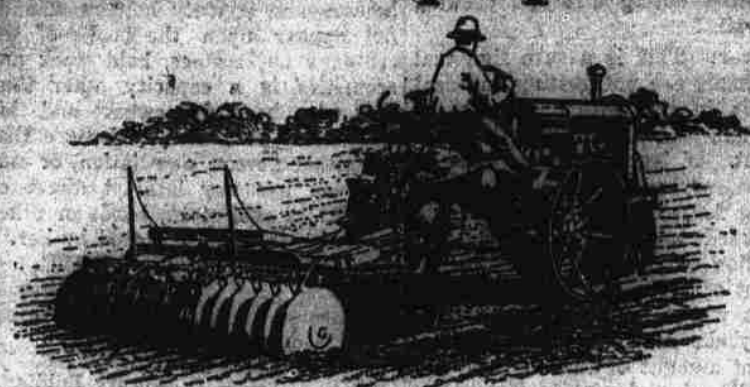
DRUNKEN DRIVER GETS 60 DAYS ON ROADS
