RECOVERED AFTER 25 YEARS

After disappearing nearly a quarter of a century ago, an automatic recorder of conditions in the upper air is back in the Weather Bureau in Washington, D. C.

In the summer of 1913, W. R. Gregg, now chief of the Bureau, then on the staff of the aerological division, and Captain B. J. Sherry, of the Signal Corps, released 23 metorrographs attached to sounding balloons to earth after the balloons burst in various parts of the sky, Their tracings of were recovered. temperature and humidity fluctuations in the air through which they had passed were recorded. The other eight, including no. 250, were given up for lost. Late in 1936, a passerby stumbled on no. 250 partially buried in the sand near Twenty-Nine Palms, Calif.

Except for a few dents, the allmeta! instrument was in good condition. Many of the tracings on the metal recording plate could be de-ciphered. The temperature record, made by a sharp point attached to a bimetallic coil that curled or uncurled with changing temperature, still shows that meteorograph no. 250 was released at 5:05 p. m., July 25, 1913, from Avalon, Santa Catalina Island, Calif., 112 feet above sea level-temperature 75 deprees F. It rose to a height of 13.8 miles, where the temperature was 71 degrees helow zero. Meteorologists have been ; unable to make out the humidity

Many more soundings of atmosp-Many more soundings of atmospheric conditions — with greatly improved instruments—have been made alice meteorograph no. 250 took off in 1913. Radio-meteorographs that broadcast their findings while ascending, to observers on the ground, are expected soon to replace recording meteorographs like no. 250.
